Date	August 13	<p>The Hubbert Peak Theory posits that for any given geographical area, from an individual oil field to the planet as a whole, the rate of petroleum production tends to follow a bell-shaped curve. It also shows how to calculate the point of maximum production in advance based on discovery rates, production rates and cumulative production. Early in the curve (pre-peak), the production rate increases due to the discovery rate and the addition of infrastructure. Late in the curve (post-peak), production declines due to resource depletion.</p> <p>The Hubbert peak theory is based on the fundamental observation that the amount of oil under the ground is finite. The theory is named after American geophysicist Marion King Hubbert (far left in photo), who created a method of modeling a peak rate of production given an assumed ultimate recovery volume. Hubbert's theory was initially greeted with skepticism by many in the oil industry.</p> <p>Hubbert's peak can refer to the peaking of production of a particular area, which has now been observed for many fields and regions. "Peak Oil" as a proper noun, or <i>Hubbert's peak</i> applied more generally, refers to a singular event in history: the peak of the entire planet's oil production. After Peak Oil, according to the Hubbert Peak Theory, the rate of oil production on Earth will enter a terminal decline.</p>

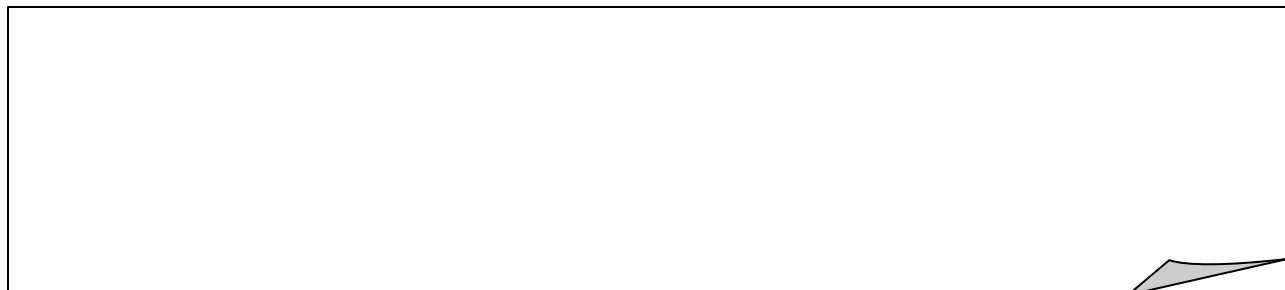

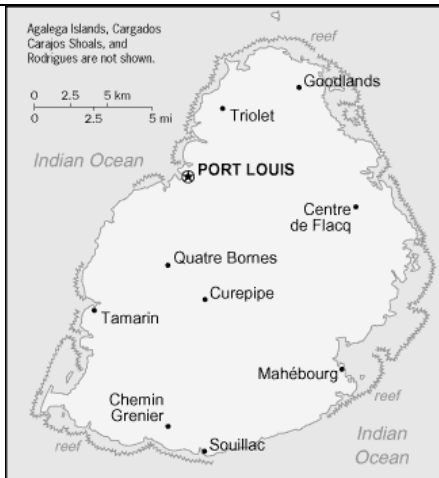

Date	August 15	Long uninhabited, Mauritius was probably visited by Arab and Malay seamen and later by Portuguese and Dutch explorers. Although Britain overcame later French occupation, the French culture dominated. Mauritius became independent on 12 March 1968 and one month later became a member of the UN. The population of Mauritius in 2005 was estimated by the United Nations at 1,243,000, which placed it at number 149 in population among the 193 nations of the world. The capital city, Port Louis, had a population of 143,000 in that year. English and French are the official languages; however, Creole, derived from French, is the most widely spoken (by 80.5% of the population). The Mauritius economy, diverse and conservatively managed, is based on export-oriented manufacturing (mainly clothing), sugar, and tourism. Most of production is done by private enterprise, with the government largely limiting its role to providing institutional. Our own Vice-President for Instruction, Dr. Rajen Vurdien, grew up on Mauritius before beginning his journey to Europe and the United States. Situated among the Indian Ocean Islands, Mauritius is less known to westerner than other countries. Dr. Vurdien has been asked to share his knowledge and memories of this distant land. 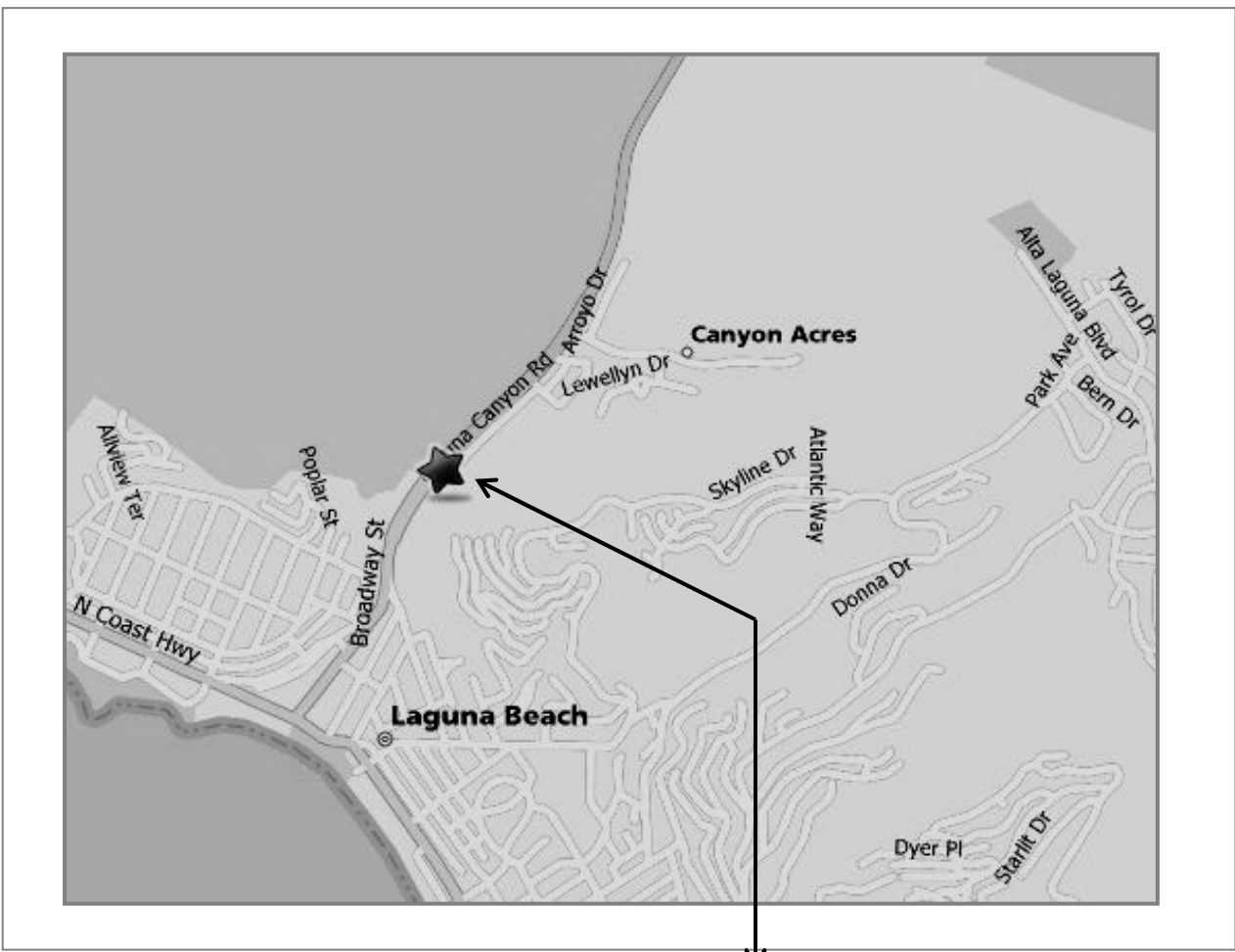

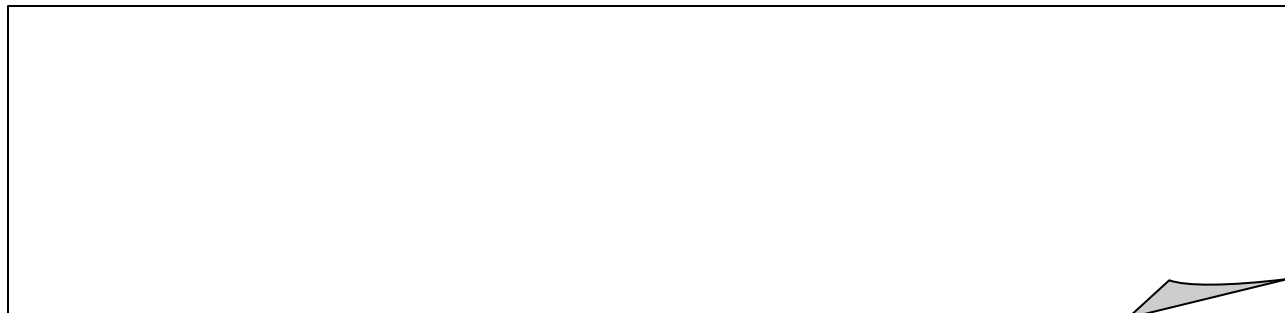

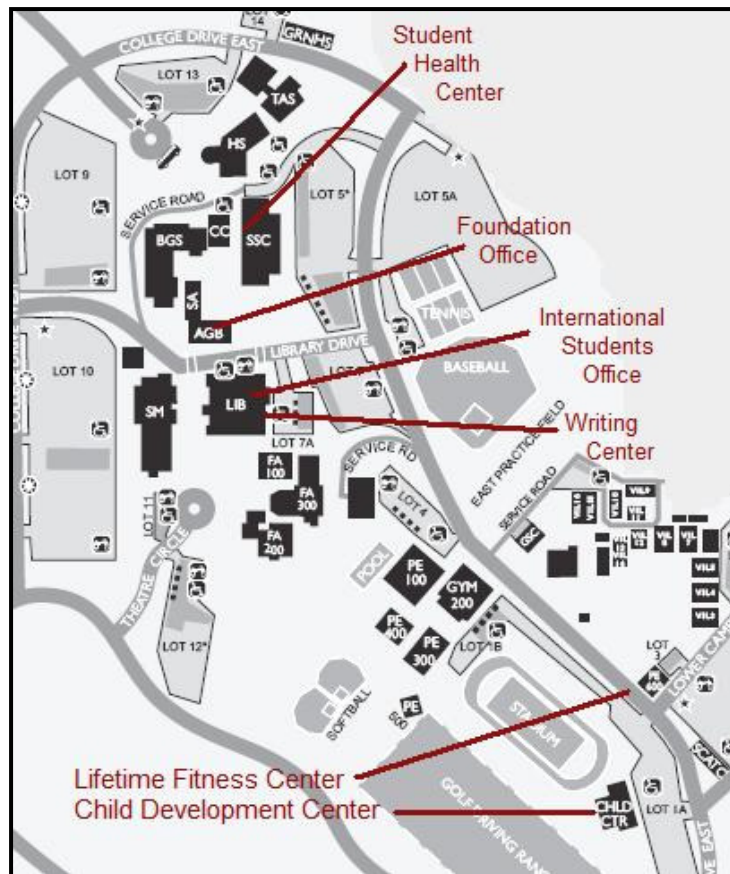
