<p>To conclude your search for information and begin your writing</p>	<p>Identifying whether you need any additional evidence to make your point</p> <p>Considering how soon your work is due</p> <p>Finding less brand new information and more redundant information when you search because you've already exhausted the available resources and have a view of all sides</p>	<p>Sense of relief</p> <p>Satisfaction</p> <p>or</p> <p>Disappointment</p>	<p>Rechecking the sources of information you initially overlooked or chose not to check</p> <p>Confirming that you quoted or paraphrased the information correctly</p> <p>Confirming that you have all the information you need to complete your bibliographic citations</p>	<p>Returning to the library's resources to make a last search for anything you missed before</p> <p>Keeping books and print-outs until you finish writing so you can recheck any information that's not clear in your notes</p>
