114	5. PUBLIC COMMENTS

116	Carmenmara Hernandez-Bravo commented about the travel abroad classes- July 4th is a
117	holiday in the United States, but July 28 th is a holiday in Spain. She inquired that if she takes
118	her students to an event on one of those holidays, is that allowable? Senate Exec responded
119	that it is a district question, possibly contract dictated, and beyond what can be answered
120	at this time.

122	April Cubbage commented about flipping instruction to optional Zoom events on days of
123	heavy rain or other issues that could impact our students' ability to arrive to class safely.
124	Margot Lovett responded that we are discussing the Emergency Operations Plan today in

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Senate so this is a timely issue. Ann Marie Breslin followed up with a report from one of her students that two of her classes had been cancelled and wondered why the other one was not. Jenny Langrell added that this may be a Faculty Association issue.

Nancy Allah commented that the Faculty Center is not safe since if there was an emergency, there is only one exit. She would like this addressed.

6. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Margot Lovett informed senators of the following:

Senator Roth initiated SB 895 which authorizes a pilot program where up to 15 CCs with existing accredited Associate Degree in Nursing programs can offer a Bachelor's of Science in Nursing degree. The goal is the address California's shortage of Registered Nurses. It will also give students the opportunity to earn an affordable BS in Nursing close to home. The proposed bill is co-sponsored by the Community College League of California (CCLC). The CEOCCC (Chief Executive Officers of the California Community Colleges) is in support of this bill, as are various community college districts. This bill is in its initial stages. Wonderful Nancy shared that the application process and acceptance into our existing nursing program is very difficult.

Jenny Langrell shared that nothing new is happening. Frank Gonzalez added that the issue about faculty using personal days for leave during severe weather has been a topic of interest.

203	Michelle Duffy shared with senators that the list of courses up for scheduled review will be
204	posted in the Curriculum Committee SharePoint on or before March 1 st . Courses are then
205	due to be reviewed and launched in META by April 30 th . A list of workshops to help with
206	scheduled review will held in the Faculty Center beginning the first week of March. Dates
207	and times are posted in the Curriculum Committee SharePoint and on the Curriculum
208	Committee website.

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D. Middle College High School Feasibility Task Force Update

Margot Lovett shared that the task force met on February 9th to work on the template for questions to ask: location, impact on classes etc... Last week, Kari Irwin, Chantelle Gil, Georgina Martinez, and Margot attended the Middle College National Consortium in Newport Beach which was aimed at the high schools rather than colleges; on the day that Margot attended, nothing was presented about the relationship between the MCHSs and the colleges. However, they met faculty from San Diego City College which has a middle college high school and they plan to have a follow up meeting. Preliminary information suggests that there is minimal impact on instructional faculty, but it seems that a counselor will be required to work full-time with the MCHS. It is also possible that classified professionals' workload may be impacted.

On Friday, Feb. 23rd, they are meeting with the Santa Ana Community College Curriculum Chair who seems to be the liaison between the college and the MCHS. They hope to meet with classified professionals who are involved with the middle college as well. Carmenmara Hernandez-Bravo inquired if there is anyone on the committee who is bilingual; Yes, Frank and Chantelle.

E. 2025-2026 Academic Calendar

Dan Walsh shared that they are still working with IVC to finalize the calendar. Note: IVC added finals week back in so they claimed there was a discrepancy in our days. Their calendar has an earlier start in the spring so that the semester ends before Memorial Day. There is a concern that there is no break before the summer session starts. Discussion took place while comparing the calendars proposed by both colleges.

Senators agreed to continue support of the calendar we set forward. Margot Lovett will reach out to IVC to ask about their intentions with adding in finals week as well as from our Classified staff to ask about impact of an early start.

10. NEW BUSINESS

A. Creating an Equity-Minded Syllabus Presentation by Michelle Pacansky-Brock

Kim Stankovich shared that Dr. Michelle Pancansky-Brock, the leader in developing a liquid syllabus, will be coming to Saddleback on Friday, March 1st from 11:30-1:30pm. Refreshments are from 11:30-12:30 and she will be speaking 12:30-1:30pm in HS 145. The presentation is entitled "Humanizing Pre-Course Contact with a Liquid Syllabus." She distributed flyers about the event.

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B. Professional Development/Teaching Innovations Committee Update

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Kim Stankovich updated senators about the Professional Development/Teaching Innovations Committee which meets on the 3rd Tuesday of the month from 3-4:30pm; She shared that Faculty Professional Development calendar and discussed the committee's accomplishment of their goals.

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C. College Emergency Operations Plan

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Margot Lovett shared that our college's Emergency Operations Plan was last updated in 2009. Chief Higa and our college's police department are in the process of revising it. Senate Exec may review it as well to give feedback. The need for faculty involvement in decision making during emergency situations is crucial since we interact directly with students. In the recent heavy rains, students and employees using the freeway to come to campus passed signs saying "Stay home, don't drive," yet the message from the college was that it was business as usual". Faculty would like the option of holding class online in such a situation. Ann Marie Breslin recommended involving the Faculty Association as well.

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D. Bloom Program Update

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Efren Rangel gave an update on the Bloom Program (Building Leadership Opportunities through Outstanding Mentorship- Internship Program) which started last year for students who are completing their Master's or Doctorate Program and are interested in being a college instructor.

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The process:

- 1. Mentor interest form submission (August-Sept)
- 2. Interns recruitment based on faculty disciplines noted on Mentor forms (Oct-)
- 3. Interviews/Intern Screening (Late Oct-)
- 4. Paring (December)

The schedule/opportunities:

- January- orientations with mentors and interns. Interns attend classes/ask questions
- Feb- Debrief
- March- Full-time/part-time faculty hiring; debrief
- April- Academic support services panel
- May- Debrief and certificate celebration
