5. Justification of recommendation for new course: How was the need for this course identified? How will this course meet student needs in ways that currently approved courses (including those from other departments) do not?

CA Assembly Bill 1705 will require math departments to reevaluate their placement practices, particularly for students who are required to take calculus for their major. The math department needs a low-unit support option to help under-prepared students succeed in second semester calculus. A similar model of support has been implemented successfully via Math 224S, 208S, and 210S, and we will implement a support course for MATH 3A (first semester calculus) in Fall 2024.

There are some algebra skills, like completing the square and long division of polynomials, that are used more extensively in MATH 3B than in MATH 3A. The same holds for certain trig identities such as the double angle formulas. Because of this, even students who have taken precalculus may find they've grown rusty on some of these skills.

Further, there are some topics covered in first semester calculus that are not used until fairly late in second semester calculus. L'Hospital's rule is a prime example of this. Since this is just a single section in MATH 3A and is generally not used until at least a month into MATH 3B (and the more complicated problems involving indeterminate powers really don't appear until the last third of the course) many students would benefit from a more thorough review of this topic than can be fit into a traditional MATH 3B class.

The other calculus topics included in this class are used extensively throughout the entire semester of MATH 3B. Providing some review of these concepts will especially benefit students who who have had any time off between first and second semester calculus, those who completed first semester calculus with a shaky understanding of some of these important concepts, and those for whom a little bit of review will allow them to approach the class with a greater degree of confidence.

The Community Health Worker (CHW) Certificate of Achievement program provides the students with the skills needed to work in public health, healthcare, and social services. CHWs provide services including health education, navigation through healthcare systems and services, health outreach, community health data collection, and health promotion. Graduates will be able to help improve quality of life by identifying the social determinants of health (SDOH) and disparities in communities, increasing access to health care services, promoting health screening, and providing public health education on available health services and recommendations. The certificate is for both entry-level individuals and for providing additional competencies to those employed in various fields. Graduates can work in various settings including healthcare clinics, mental health facilities, substance abuse programs, nursing homes, assisted living, and neighborhood and faith-based organizations.

g. Brief Description of how the idea for the new program came about: If proposal is for an OSA, include a statement why Saddleback would support an OSA in contrast to offering a certificate program.

The Community Health Worker (CHW) Program will be a 25-unit CTE certificate that meets CTE goals including workforce preparation. CHW is a pathway to the Public Health Science ADT program sharing various common and transferable courses. BLS projects a growth in demand for CHW by 12 percent from 2021 to 2031, more than the average of all other occupations. With 0 program completions in 2021 and 676 annual job openings in target occupations, the CHW program addresses this worker shortages and the growing trend/need for CHWs to provide preventative health services that bridge the gap between health/social services and the community to improve the quality of healthcare. Students who successfully complete the CHW program will gain competencies in communication skills as it relates to medicine and healthcare, healthcare services navigation and coordination, health education and promotion, knowledge of public health principles, etc., that can lead to employment as a Community Health Worker, seek higher education in public health, and further explore related fields in public/allied health occupations.

Ethnic Studies is an interdisciplinary field that centralizes and redefines the experiences of racialized and minoritized communities in the United States. Through an intersectional analysis, students examine concepts such as ethnicity, race, class, nationality, gender, and sexuality and interrogate interlocking systems of oppression in order to unsettle and disrupt them. Courses in the program provide a critical racial perspective with a focus on the history, culture, art, and literature of African American, Asian American and Pacific Islander, Chicanx/Latinx, Native American, and Middle Eastern American communities. An associate degree in Ethnic Studies prepares students for transfer and careers in fields such as education, law, social work, immigrant rights, civil rights, journalism, public health, community organizing, social justice work, government, psychology, and public policy, among others.

g. Brief Description of how the idea for the new program came about: If proposal is for an OSA, include a statement why Saddleback would support an OSA in contrast to offering a certificate program.

Ethnic Studies is now a requirement for all students transferring to the CSU system and potentially the UC system. Therefore, students will be exposed to the field but are currently unable to complete a degree in the program at Saddleback College. Pre-COVID, our old ES degree was eliminated in order to update it and develop an AD-T. The AD-T is still not approved on the state level and the ES faculty would like to offer an AA to students who are interested in transferring to the UCs and to private colleges and universities.

New Administration of Justice **Associate in Science for Transfer**

The Associate in Science in Administration of Justice for Transfer degree involves the study of the essential functions, roles, principles and systems of the police, the courts and corrections. This course of study will provide foundational skills and knowledge of the criminal justice system, criminal law and ethics and the variety of careers in administrative justice and related fields.

Upon completion of the degree, students will have a strong academic foundation in Administrative Justice and satisfy <u>lower division requirements for transfer in preparation for</u> upper division baccalaureate study at the CSU or entry into the workforce. The Associate in Science in Administration of Justice for Transfer Degree provides a strong foundation in skills and knowledge for careers in detention, probation, parole, law enforcement, paralegal and the courts. Students who complete this degree receive priority admission to the CSU system, though admission to a specific campus or major is not quaranteed.

Students who complete this program will be able to:

- Differentiate the roles of the law enforcement, courts and corrections systems of criminal justice.
- Recognize the importance of, and practice of, ethical behavior in a professional criminal justice work setting, both within the agency and within the community.
- Properly document a criminal investigation, crime analysis report, intelligence report, or other criminal justice documentation.
- Demonstrate an understanding of contemporary issues in law enforcement and operational impact by analyzing crime prevention issues relevant to the justice system and public safety using methods acceptable per industry recognized standards for entry level positions.
- Critically consider, analyze, and research special issues in criminology and criminal justice and their effects on society.

New <u>Law, Public Policy, and Society</u> Associate in Arts for Transfer

The Law, Public Policy, and Society Associate in Arts Degree for Transfer (ADT) is designed to prepare students for a seamless transfer into the California State University (CSU) system to complete a baccalaureate degree in Law, Public Policy, and Society or similar majors such as Sociology, Anthropology, Criminal Justice, Communications, Political Science, Philosophy, Public Administration, Linguistics, American Studies, and Humanities.

This interdisciplinary degree focuses on the development of communication and critical thinking skills, introduces students to the legal field, and prepares students for further study in a variety of majors.

Current Dance Associate of Arts

The curriculum in the Dance degree is presented in an active learning environment where students are trained in both dance technique and theory classes to prepare them for future careers in the performing arts and related fields. Courses cover major dance technique forms, choreography, dance production, dance history and somatic practices. Upon completion of the Dance A.A. degree, students will be prepared to transfer to a four-year institution to pursue a baccalaureate or higher degree in dance or a related field; colleges to which they might considering transferring include CSU Dominguez Hills, CSU Los Angeles, SFSU, CSU Sonoma, UC Berkeley, UC Davis, UC Riverside and UC San Diego. Some B.A./B.F.A in Dance programs require an audition: students should check the transfer requirements for individual schools. While a baccalaureate degree is recommended, students completing their Dance A.A. will also be eligible to audition and apply for opportunities in the dance field, including as a performer with professional companies or touring productions, a teacher at a dance studio, or a choreographer.

Current Environmental Science Associate in Science for Transfer

Environmental Science is an interdisciplinary course of study that draws on science, economics, and mathematics to produce an understanding of the complex interactions between humans and the environment. The Associate in Science in Environmental Science for Transfer Degree provides students with a core curriculum to develop key skills for applying biological, physical, and chemical scientific principles to the study of the environment. Students will also develop skills for critical/analytical thinking and problem-solving that are needed to develop solutions to environmental problems at the local, national, and global level.

Students who complete the Associate in Science in Environmental Science for Transfer Degree receive priority admission to the California State University system, although admission to a specific campus is not guaranteed.

The Associate in Science in Environmental Science for Transfer Degree prepares students to transfer to a 4-year university for further study to prepare for a wide variety of careers. Environmental scientists typically use their knowledge and skills to protect the environment and human health. They may clean up polluted areas, advise policymakers, or work with government and industry to reduce waste and improve environmental conditions. Other career possibilities are academia, environmental law, environmental consulting, biodiversity conservation, and resource management.

- Demonstrate knowledge of the physical, biological, ecological, and social sciences required to effectively address current environmental issues and be prepared to pursue further study in an environmental science program at the baccalaureate level.

Revised Environmental Science Associate in Science for Transfer

The Associate in Science in Environmental Science for Transfer Degree provides students with a core curriculum to develop key skills for applying biological, physical, and chemical scientific principles to the study of the environment. Students will also develop skills for critical/analytical thinking and problem-solving that are needed to develop solutions to environmental problems at the local, national, and global level.

Students who complete the Associate in Science in Environmental Science for Transfer Degree receive priority admission to the California State University system, although admission to a specific campus is not guaranteed.

The Associate in Science in Environmental Science for Transfer Degree prepares students to transfer to a 4-year university for further study to prepare for a wide variety of careers. Environmental scientists typically use their knowledge and skills to protect the environment and human health. They may clean up polluted areas, advise policymakers, or work with government and industry to reduce waste and improve environmental conditions. Other career possibilities are academia, environmental law, environmental consulting, biodiversity conservation, and resource management.
