


What is a Foundation Scholarship?



A scholarship is a financial award given to a student to support their education.

This money does not have to be paid back.



Who is Saddleback College Foundation?



The Saddleback College Foundation is a non-profit organization that supports student programs and students' education all funded by donors.

Who are donors? They are individuals or service clubs that coordinate with the Foundation to lessen the burden of students' college expenses through monetary donations.





How and when do I apply for scholarships?



Students apply online through the scholarship portal during the application period from Jan. 2 to Feb. 23, 2024.

Do you have to apply individually to the different scholarships?




Submit one application known as the General Application. Based on the student's answers and information such as GPA, major and other criteria, the scholarship platform will automatically match students to the scholarships that they are eligible for.

How is the decision on winners made?



Awards are primarily based on applicants' review scores, however the highest score does not guarantee a scholarship as there may be other factors to consider.





When will I find out if I will received a scholarship?



After the application period closes, a committee reviews and scores hundreds of applications, then award recipients are selected.

All applicants will be notified by email no later than the beginning of May.

When do I get the check?

Checks start processing mid-August of fall semester, only after recipients send in their thank you letter to their scholarship donor.

Checks are mailed to the student's mailing address on file with Admissions and Records, or to their transfer school's financial aid department.



Are there scholarships for transferring students?



Yes, scholarship recipients transferring to a 4-year institution must email "proof of enrollment" (a minimum of 6 units) to the Foundation.



Are scholarships added to my financial aid package?





If identified as having financial need through your CCC application or your FAFSA on file with the Financial Aid Department, a financial aid package may have been created for you.

Scholarships are counted towards a student's financial aid package.



Can I lose my scholarship?

Yes, there are a number of ways to lose your scholarship, such as:

- 1. Enroll in fewer than 6 units or drop below 6 units for fall semester, if receiving an Osher scholarship, or drop all classes.
- 2. Not in good academic standing before fall semester by dropping below a 2.0 GPA or placed on academic probation.
- 3. No longer meeting a scholarship's criteria such as changing majors before the fall semester, etc.
- 4. Change 'College of Record' to IVC or another community college.







Once you access your scholarship account, you may view multiple pages by clicking the tabs on the top ribbon.






You must submit your general application in order to match to other recommended scholarship opportunities.

The General Application has a list of questions to answer and four essay questions to write. If you need some time to get through the application, click the "Save and Keep Editing" button at the bottom of the page until you are ready to submit.



Scholarship General Application Essays

Some Advice for Getting Started – by Ryan Hitch

- A 250-word max means that you should avoid unnecessary introduction or conclusion paragraphs in your response. Instead, focus on the content of your answer and organizing that response in paragraph form.
- It can be challenging to write about yourself. If you're having trouble getting started, or you get stuck along the way, consider asking a friend or family member how they would answer that question about you.






Write briefly about a "personal challenge" and how you overcame that challenge that resulted in a positive outcome.

(This does not have to be a traumatic experience. A personal challenge is **something you alone face**, that requires great effort and determination **to overcome or fix.**)



 Challenges come in big and small sizes. Don't rule something out if you think it ultimately had a positive impact on your life.





Essay Two

Writing Tips

- Focus on what you know, not on what you don't know. While you may not have a precise major picked out (ex: Chemistry), you may have a general area in mind (ex: STEM field).
- Use concrete language wherever possible. Writing, "I want a career helping people," may mean a lot to you as somebody who has spent some time thinking about it, but the person reading your essay doesn't know you or the time you've put into that goal. Instead, consider, "I'm interested in working at a hospital because I enjoy helping people."

Write a brief explanation on how and why you recently helped a fellow Saddleback College student or helped someone by a random act of kindness. (250 word max)


It doesn't have to be a grand effort to impact someone's life by lending a hand, giving directions or connecting with a person in some way to help them.




Essay Three

Writing Tips

- Like challenges, helping comes in big and small sizes. Don't rule something out if you think it had an impact on your life.
- If you're having trouble getting started on this question, this would be a good one to share with friends or family (who may have their own stories about how you helped them).





Essay Four

Writing Tips

- While it's easy to focus on the monetary aspect of this question, it doesn't all have to be about need. This money is meant to help you do something important with your education, and this question is a good place to talk about that.
- For example, you could talk about how this money might help you commute to school, manage childcare, or pay for expensive textbooks to help you succeed in those important classes you're taking.




Organizing Your Response

- When writing a paragraph, the first sentence is considered your topic sentence. Think of it like a mini-thesis statement for your paragraph. It should be broad enough to cover all the content in your paragraph, but specific enough to give the reader a good idea about what will be discussed.
- Consider using transition words like "first, then, finally" and more to create a smooth flow within the paragraph.
- Use the last sentence to briefly recap your response (and try to work in word(s) from the prompt if you can).



Editing and Proofreading

- Try writing your responses over more than one day. Time can always help you catch what you miss.
- Read your response out loud, and slowly, at least once before submitting. How you read a passage in your head can sometimes differ from how you read it out loud, and head", it's important that what you read it out loud.
- Consider asking someone to read your responses before you submit.




Asking for Help

- Remember the Saddleback Foundation offers several resources in the form of Zoom info sessions, website resources, and more.
- Consider reaching out to your current or past English instructor for assistance. Even a high school English instructor could be a useful guide in this process.
- But do know that LRC tutors are only allowed to help you with writing related to a class that you're taking.




Miscellaneous information

- Suggestion: write your essays using a word document so you can save them in case you need them at a later time, then copy and paste to the essay question in the general application.
- Applicants are able to receive more than one scholarship and the award amounts vary from \$500 to over \$1,000.
- If you are currently not enrolled, you must enroll in late registration now in order to be eligible for scholarships.
- If you have questions, reach out to me as early as possible. Do not wait until the last day!
