- 130 Dan Walsh, Senate Exec, shared that at the last BOT meeting there was proposal to 131 lease out the OTAS building to a charter school. This was done without faculty 132 consultation and went against the Facilities Master Plan. Additionally, it was later 133 asserted that the Academic Senate had been informed of this; however, that did not 134 happen. 135 Erica Vogel, Humanities and Social Sciences, shared that Virgil Ortiz, the artist in 136 residence, gave a presentation today and student work will be presented in the 137 gallery at the end of the month. 138 • Sarah Chang, Transfer Center Coordinator, shared that there will be a University Transfer Fair 10-1pm on Wednesday, October 11th in the quad. 139 140 141 142 6. PRESIDENT'S REPORT 143 144 Margot Lovett informed senators of the following: 145 BOT meeting - the trustees had major concerns about the potential lease of OTAS to • 146 a charter school. In the end, the college and the district decided not to pursue this. 147 There was no consultation with any of the governance groups. The possibility of 148 establishing a middle college at Saddleback in cooperation with CUSD was then 149 brought up. The administration has assured us that all shared governance groups 150 will be part of the discussions of this. Once there is additional information to 151 present, this will be on the agenda at a future Senate meeting. 152 Chancellor's Council - sets the agenda for the BOT. At a recent EEO/DEI committee 153 meeting, Title 5 changes were discussed; Faculty are mandated reporters- students 154 often want to disclose, but not be reported; Students are okay to share hypothetical 155 situations without faculty being required to report. Dan Walsh added that 156 hypothetical situations should not be used with minors. It was asked if the 157 mandated reporting law was still in effect. Emily Quinlan clarified that per California 158 Penal Code 11165.7, faculty are mandatory reporters regarding minors- not adults. 159 Academic Senates of Community Colleges are grouped into areas. We are in Area D 160 and as a group we are charged with reviewing and bringing forward resolutions to 161 the state academic senate. The Area D meeting is on October 27th. Resolutions 162 created by local academic senates will be discussed. They will be brought to the Fall 163 Plenary which takes place in Costa Mesa from November 16-18th. 164 165 166 7. A. Saddleback Rising Scholars

291 Jose Lumbreras and Ryan Monte updated AS senators on the happenings of Rising Scholars.

292 Rising Scholars is a program that supports formerly incarcerated students who have been

293 negatively impacted by the U.S. judicial system. A presentation included sharing of what the

294 program has been doing, Rising Scholars services/incentives, as well as program eligibility

and requirements (definition of formerly incarcerated was provided). Ally training during

298	A few questions were posed by senators:
299	• Michele Rousseau asked how many students were currently being served. Response:
300	Currently there are 16 students with the goal to expand to 100 students during the
301	3-year grant.
302	 Ann Marie Breslin asked about the most efficient way for faculty to connect
303	potential candidates to the Rising Scholar program. Response: use the email
304	scrisingscholars@saddleback.edu
305	 Jeff Barnett volunteered his service to the program and shared that vets who are
306	court-martialed and coming out of Miramar prison have lost all of their rights. He
307	asked if they qualify for inclusion in Rising Scholars. Response: Yes.
308	Michelle Gustafson asked when the students involved in Rising Scholars would be
309	attending the Counseling presentation. Response: November 17 th
310	• Wonderful Nancy asked if the program is working to restore voting rights. Response:
311 312	At this time the program is working to build themselves within the educational setting.
313	• April Cubbage shared that in the state of California once you are off parole you can
314	have voting rights reestablished. She asked if new regulations are just for current
315	students. She also expressed her concern about the number of check-ins carried out
316	by the program that could seem like surveillance. Response: yes, current students
317	only. As far as the check-ins, they are not punitive. It is to make sure that needs are
318	being met. Also, check-ins are with others that were formerly incarcerated
319	individuals so it doesn't feel like students are being monitored.
320	
321	B. DACA Update
322	
323	Aimee Vaquera shared a PowerPoint to update senators on DACA. Case update: The 5 th
324	Circuit court ruled DACA unconstitutional, but did not ask the federal government to act (no
325	deportations or removal of work permits). Biden administration released a statement saying
326	that they will appeal. It will likely make it to the Supreme Court.
327	At this time, it means that DACA and work authorizations are still intact, no new
328	applications, renewals are active, and Advanced Parole is still active.
329	Looking at what is to come? Is there any talk about making DACA permanent? Response:
330
