#### E. Compressed Calendar

Chris McDonald updated senators on the 16-week compressed calendar discussion. He distributed drafts of sample calendars:

- 1. Typical calendar
- 2. Original 16-week calendar- when compressed Saturday becomes an instructional date; Commencement ends up being in June; this version means no January paycheck, but faculty would get a June paycheck
- 3. 16-week with extended summer- Get pay for January and ends in May; problem is overlap of grades being due after the next semester has started; limited offerings for small 4-week intersession
- 4. Removed winter intersession

Any version of the compressed calendar means that some areas: counseling, library, etc... would need to provide services during the intersession and therefore would potentially be moved to an 11-month salary schedule and on a different pay scale to account for the extra work days.
