How will this course meet student needs in ways that currently approved courses (including those from other departments) do not?

In a memo sent by CCCCO on May 1<sup>st</sup>, 2023, guidance was provided on how California Community College Equitable Placement, Support and Completion allocated funding can be used by individual institutions. One of the qualified uses of funds was for "creation, implementation, and evaluation of concurrent supports or support services to increase throughput rates for transfer-level mathematics/quantitative reasoning and English courses." Specifically, the memo states that colleges may use funds to "develop or expand support labs, tutoring centers, and embedded tutoring and incentivize student participation in these support services."

Saddleback already provides tutoring services and embedded tutoring, but has intentionally differentiated these services from "Supplemental Instruction." Based on the validation process required by AB 1705, it is highly likely that Saddleback will soon need to make calculus the baseline placement for all Business and STEM students, regardless of their high school coursework. Students who have struggled in prior math courses or who have not passed precalculus in high school will need targeted instruction to bridge knowledge in order to succeed at the calculus level. In addition to offering a 2-unit corequisite support option, the math department would like to provide an alternative option that supports flexible scheduling needs for Saddleback's diverse student population.

Other California Community Colleges have already implemented math support labs successfully, so this is an opportunity for Saddleback to develop its own version that is designed with intentionality and builds upon best-practices. Additionally, the Saddleback Math Skills Lab can be implemented as an open-entry/open-exit course for the purposes of collecting apportionment (Ed Code Section 58164).
