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CCN Phase III templates are being completed. Once they are released, they will be built
in META and faculty discipline chairs will be notified. CCN Phase III courses are
scheduled to be implemented in fall 2027.

• New courses approved to move forward must be built in META by Friday, December 5th. In addition, any programs approved to move forward must have their paperwork (narratives, program master, LMI/analysis if needed etc...) submitted by December 5th.

• The next window for new courses proposals and new program initiation forms closes January 23, 2026.

 The Curriculum Team is working through some recent Title 5 changes to the COR including adding course disciplines and incorporating DEIA. Stay tuned for more information in early Spring.

D. Banner

Dan Walsh opened the floor for comments/concerns. Emily Quinlan asked for the Academic Senate to request the results of the anonymous Banner survey and for them to be compiled unedited and sent to the Board of Trustees. Dan Walsh agreed that the results need to be released widely so that redaction of comments cannot happen.

A new complaint about Banner was that this month's paychecks were a day late and many faculty were unaware that overload is on a second check.

Morgan Barrows noted that the ability to check your pay in Banner is not functioning. She also mentioned trouble with students enrolling. Students could not be dropped and could have missed the refund window. Second eight-week students were not loaded into Banner in a timely fashion. Poly Pantelidou shared that even when she dropped students, she could not enroll other students until the drops cleared her roster. Jennifer Rohles shared that there are still students in Banner who are not on Canvas. Dan Walsh asked that senators please keep reporting issues to Chris McDonald. Maria Mayenzet said that Office of Admissions and Records helped.

Christina Smith shared that students had to take themselves off the waitlist in order to use an add code which made students very nervous. Other students had to have Admissions and Records enroll them with the APC code. She recommends keeping a screen shot of who you drop.

Megan Martin asked if the issue with prerequisites has been resolved. She had neither of her classes filled. Adrianna Maher, student representative, shared that she had trouble with this as well. In addition, financial aid payments were late.

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Taylor Brooks shared that one of his students was trying to apply for a certificate/award in Banner and there was not a place to do this. They found a place to apply for commencement, but not an award. Sarah Chang said for students to see the screen they need; they would need to update their major to apply for the degree. Each award/certificate/degree needs to be added into their profile. The auto-award system is no longer in effect. This is dramatically going to impact the number of awards given and there will be a negative ripple effect.

Nancy Allah asked how students can see grades from summer 2025 and prior. Students need to go into legacy MySite.

Bruce Gilman noted that complaints are being dumped at the district level and asked if there are other actions being taken? Maybe at Consultation Council? Dan Walsh shared that through discussions it was suggested to wait to see how the second eight-week classes go since things should function smoother. Since the second week classes have started, there has not been a CC meeting. Yesterday's CC meeting was cancelled. Bruce added that someone who has power to make decisions and take action needs to be in this room.

Consensus amongst senators was that it appears that many in higher positions seem unaware of the real issues with Banner. It is almost as if they are in denial or arrogance has taken over. The chat with the Board of Trustees was frustrating and the Chancellor did not even want to hear or address the serious issues with Banner. She was completely dismissive when Jane Medling spoke.

Jennifer Hedgecock added that one voice cannot be heard, and it seems like we need to be more vocal. Not wanting to work in the district, students being hurt, the joy of teaching being gone etc... are the things that need to be mentioned in order to effectively communicate with the board. Emily Quinlan noted that students can go to the BoT meetings as well. Maybe ASG should attend and voice their concerns/complaints. It was asked if students were invited to the Town Hall or sent the survey. Our ASG representatives did not receive notice of either, but Michelle Gustafson noted that a student survey did go out.

Claire Cesareo reminded senators that payroll is not just Banner's fault. It is payroll as well. There is a lack of accountability. There are certain items that were not paid that were court ordered and not checked.

Counseling in still functioning in crisis mode and basically put out fires.

E. 2027-2028 Academic Calendar – New FLEX Requirements

Dan Walsh showed the calendar with the corrections and moved the faculty contractual day to Wednesday, October 13th. There must be professional development activities available for everyone not just faculty. Adding the flex day in October gives us a college-wide professional development day. This is difficult for Classified since the start of the semester is so busy. Discussion about whether this contractual day should be moved so that it falls on the week after
