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### Dual Enrollment, Concurrent Enrollment, and Articulation

#### What is CATEMA?

#### CATEMA vs Petition Process

**HIGH SCHOOL ARTICULATION:** High school courses taken by high school students during the traditional school day, courses are aligned with a community college course in the same discipline, courses are taught by the high school teachers, courses are offered on the high school campus, serves high school students only. Articulated courses from the high school are counted as credit by exam.

**DUAL ENROLLMENT (CCAP):** College courses taken by high school students, courses typically offered on the high school campus during traditional school day, courses are taught by high school teachers who meet community college minimum qualifications or a faculty from the college. CCAP Dual enrollment courses may only be taken by high school students and all fees are waived. Students earn high school and college credit. (CCAP refers to College and Career Access Pathways).

**CONCURRENT ENROLLMENT:** College courses taken by high school students outside of the traditional school day, courses are typically offered on community college campus, courses are taught by community college faculty, they are open to the public.

**CATEMA:** The **Career And Technical Education Management Application (CATEMA)** is a web-based system that manages the high school articulated class credit with Saddleback College. Saddleback College will be using CATEMA to validate and transcribe articulated credits earned for students.

**CATEMA vs PETITION PROCESS:** CATEMA is automating and transcribing credit earned in their HS articulated class in a seamless manner for the students. It is streamlining an old paper petition process which required students meeting with a Saddleback Counselor and submitting all necessary documents for review. The paper petition will always be made available for students not entered in the CATEMA system. Students may petition for credit up to five years from the date of completion of the articulated course. At the end of this document, you can find the steps to complete the paper petition process.
